## SUNDAY WORSHIP IN FEBRUARY

### February 2 – The Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord

Also known as "Candlemas", this day marks the conclusion of the season of Christmas. One of the earliest of festivals in the Christian church dating from the 4<sup>th</sup> century, Candlemas was known for blessing of all the candles in the church for the year ahead. It was a way of underscoring the truth of Simeon's confession that this baby Jesus was "a light for the revelation to the Gentiles" and a light for glory to Israel. In the Episcopal calendar this day takes precedence over the Fourth Sunday of Epiphany which doesn't happen very often!

### February 9 – Commemoration of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and modern reformers

Due to the Annual Parish Meeting the commemoration of Martin Luther King has been moved to the month of February. Special music will highlight not only Dr. King but Harriet Tubman, a conductor on the underground railroad at 10:00 am.

### February 16 – The Feast of Absalom Jones

Continuing our celebration of the contributions of African Americans to The Episcopal Church we will observe the Feast of Absalom Jones, the first African American ordained as priest in in the Episcopal church on September 21, 1802. In addition, two guests will join us to speak about the importance of our Historic Black Episcopal Universities, in particular St. Augustine in Raleigh, NC. The 10:00 am service will have music appropriate to the occasion.

### February 23 – World Mission Sunday The Last Sunday of Epiphany

The last Sunday of Epiphany is observed as World Mission Sunday in the Episcopal Church. The Anglican Church of which The Episcopal Church is a part spans the globe. We reflect on what it means for us to go into the whole world sharing the Good News as we officially say goodbye to Rev. Becky on her last Sunday with us as Interim Rector.

# WHAT ARE YOU DOING FOR LENT 2020?

It's almost here! Lent starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter. This year Lent starts on February 26th and ends on April 9th. It lasts for 40 days (40 weekdays; Sundays are not counted), representing the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness.

Lent is a season for reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. It emphasizes sacrifice: fasting, abstinence, and penitence that remind us of Christ's sacrificial life and death. Some people volunteer at a food pantry for Lent. Some people give up things for Lent. Others engage in study and meditation to prepare for Easter.

What are you going to do for Lent this year? Here's what some members of All Saints will be doing.

>For Lent 2020 the adult Sunday School class will read and discuss *Liturgy of the Ordinary: Sacred Practices in Everyday Life* by Tish Harrison Warren. The author shows the benefits of adopting a slower pace in everyday life, stopping to smell the roses, recognizing that the secular is shot through with the sacred, and that ordinary things take us into the presence of God. This can be a life-changing book, especially if you read the book and also attend the Sunday School class where it is discussed. The class meets in the Vestry room on Sundays from 9:00-9:50 am. We welcome new members, either attending every week or only occasionally.

>The chapters in the Warren book provide weekly readings during Lent. But some members of the Sunday School class want a daily reading to supplement the weekly chapter. Here are three suggestions you might consider.

>A very good supplement is *Forward Day by Day*. The Forward Movement has been a ministry of the Episcopal Church for 85 years. Four times a year it publishes a pocket-size booklet that suggests Bible readings for the day and provides a meditation or explanation of the reading. The booklet costs only \$1. Copies are available in the literature racks at the rear of the Sanctuary. You'll want the issue for February, March, and April.

>An alternative to *Forward Day by Day* is Ken Wilson's book *God Be in My Head: "The Sarum Prayer."* The text of the well-known Sarum Prayer is as follows:

God be in my head--and in my understanding  
God be in my eyes--and in my looking  
God be in my mouth--and in my speaking  
God be in my heart--and in my thinking  
God be at my end--and at my departing

Wilson has written a short book of forty meditations on the five lines and on the poem as a whole, one meditation for each day of Lent. They're brief, but well written and insightful.

>Another good supplement to the Warren book is Tim Schenck's booklet, *Dust Bunnies in the Basket: Finding God in Lent & Easter*. Schenck, an Episcopal priest, offers good humor and spiritual direction for the journey through Lent and Easter. With keen observations and a clever wit, Schenck connects the mundane with the divine, from dust bunnies and egg hunts to foot washing and the Easter Vigil. Illustrated by popular cartoonist Jay Sidebotham,

## FROM THE DEACON'S CORNER

I believe that one of the duties of an Episcopal deacon is to bring awareness of the outside world to the congregation they serve. Hopefully, in doing so, it causes a person to think deeper about their lives and how they live them, with, and through the Body of Christ.

The topic for this issue of Saints Alive that I am writing about, also fits well into my life as a 'religious' Benediction Oblate, with my brothers at St. Gregory's, in Three Rivers.

Our Bishop, Wayne Hougland, Jr., has directed us to have a 'rule of life' to live by and to help us in our spiritual and earthly paths. My 'rule of life' of course, comes directly from my being an oblate. It has been mine since 1994, when I first became acquainted with St. Benedict.

In St. Benedict's, 'Little Book of Rules', they are, in fact, more guidelines, than fast and sure rules. Many places, in the book, he states that if you struggle with what I am proposing, then by the grace of God, do what is comfortable. The key is, 'by the Grace of God, not your ego.'

In one section of the Rule of Benedict, he tells us to think about our death 'daily'. This may seem harsh, however, after so many years of following this, I find that by doing so, I find that it has become a real part of my 'joy in life', my time with my family (wife, kids, grandkids, and my church family, you)! Death is a real part of our lives and to deny or hide from it, I believe, robs one of a full life lived.

I recently read a news article about a 71 year old, well known, Nashville singer and song writer, David Orland. I had never heard him sing, but listened and liked him. Just last Wednesday he was sitting, playing for a crowd, when he dropped his guitar pick. He said, 'excuse me', leaned down to pick it up. At that point, he had a massive heart attack, it looked as if he had just dozed off, but in fact, he had died!

No one knows when the thief in the night will come, except our Father.

## DISCERNMENT TEAM RECTOR SEARCH UPDATE

Building on the previous information you have received, the Discernment Team wishes to share with you the accepted process from where we are now, which is the candidate application stage.

1. All applicants will be screened by Canon Val Ambrose and Bishop Hougland to learn from their peers in each applicant's home diocese if there is anything that would preclude any applicant's suitability to serve as our rector.
2. The materials for all eligible and interested candidates will then be presented to the Discernment Team by Canon Val, approximately two weeks following the application submission deadline at the end of February.
3. The Discernment Team will then proceed with our own predetermined screening and interviewing schedule.
4. There is no prescribed number of candidates for consideration by the Discernment Team and we remain open to receiving directly from you, the names of potential rectors.
5. We know that there is already interest in our vacancy and remain optimistic about filling it in a discerning and timely way.
6. Our next several work sessions are devoted to preparing questions, first for the candidate field at large, then for the finalists.

# CLIMATE CHANGE REPORT

Earth's climate change is caused by the greenhouse gases, (GHG), being added to the atmosphere. Carbon dioxide, methane, nitrous oxide, and other trace gases constitute GHG. Carbon dioxide CO<sub>2</sub> is the major cause of climate change and as of September 2019 there were 408.55 parts per million (ppm) of it in the atmosphere. Back in 1880 the CO<sub>2</sub> level was 280 ppm.

Carbon dioxide has the property of being transparent to sunlight. Sunlight with an energy spectrum that spans from ultraviolet (UV) to the near infrared (IR), reaches the earth's surface and warms it. If the energy reflected from the warmed surface is too low to penetrate the CO<sub>2</sub> blanket it is reflected back trapping it from re-radiating into space. This causes earth's temperature to rise. If the temperature rises far enough the energy reflected from the warmer surface may then penetrate the CO<sub>2</sub> blanket and radiate into space. Our earth must radiate into space the same amount of energy it receives from the sun to maintain a stable temperature and a stable climate. It is a delicate balancing act. Our earth's temperature at balance, the so called Natural Greenhouse Effect, in the pre-industrial times was 59.4<sup>0</sup> F. Now our earth is at 61.6<sup>0</sup> F and rising. We are dangerously close to the tipping point of 62.1<sup>0</sup> F, only one half degree Fahrenheit higher!

As Peter Boogaart (one of the founders of Holland Chapter of Citizens Climate Lobby) points out in his article *Climate concerns more urgent than ever*, (The Holland Sentinel January 16, 2020 page A6): "No longer is there a century in which to adapt; we're down to a decade."

There needs to be a drastic change in the viewpoint of all businesses everywhere that will stop the rapid increase in CO<sub>2</sub>. But viewpoints driven by short term market opportunities don't change. The word on the street is "it will hurt our economy if we veer from the status quo." So it will take an act of Congress to change directions. We are waiting for Congress to act on climate change.

Every one of us is affected by climate change. All of us should understand that there is a crisis ahead. Like the days during WW2 every one of us in America was affected. We knew we had to do our part to win the war. We at home participated in newspaper and scrap metal drives, critical items like shoes, and gasoline, and sugar were rationed. We saved cooking fats for glycerin. We bought War Bonds. Movies, entertainment, and advertisements had war themes. There was a feeling of urgency. That 'we were in this war together with our fighting men and women. We knew it was our patriotic duty to help bring about victory'.

We need to feel that urgency now because we are at war trying to win back the climate stability of the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. While the planet burns, our Congress, and the White House are fiddling. Right now our nation's opportunity to enter the conflict is to have our legislators pass into law the **Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act H.R.763** . Would you please call House Members Fred Upton, and Bill Huizinga, and Senators Debbie Stabenow, and Gary Peters. Please respectfully urge them to take action on H.R.763 that will reduce our use of fossil fuels thus putting climate change in retrograde.

Another way to help heal our planet is to urge auto makers to spurn the market for large gasoline fueled vehicles and promote well known electric/battery powered vehicles. Tell them to run advertisements that advocate the advantages of driving electric vehicles. It will help heal our planet. Auto makers must help to reduce the need for gasoline and diesel fuel.

Urge auto makers to resurrect their plans shelved in 2002, for building **hydrogen powered cars and trucks**. Yes these will be the next generation of vehicles. For a recent status report on this see Peter Fairley's article *The H<sub>2</sub> Solution* Scientific American, February 2020 pp 36-43. If U.S. automakers stay with big gasoline and diesel cars and trucks it will delay their entry into the hydrogen era. Hydrogen used as the fuel in internal combustion engines gives the most energy per pound, and produces water vapor as the exhaust. No carbon dioxide. At the present time the exhaust gases from fossil fueled vehicles of all kinds are responsible for nearly 40% of CO<sub>2</sub> levels in the atmosphere. Migrating to hydrogen fuel would lead to a substantial reduction in atmospheric CO<sub>2</sub>. Might this approach be the *deus ex machina* to solve climate change?

With hydrogen cars coming big oil companies will be the ones to supply the needed hydrogen. At present the best approach is to use massively large electrolysis units to break down water H<sub>2</sub>O, into hydrogen and oxygen and powered with solar and wind energy farms. It's already being done in some European countries. Push refineries to produce the hydrogen needed for the next generation powered vehicle development and manufacture.

Let this year 2020 be the year of action. Congress should be reminded again and again to move legislation and pass H.R. 763 into Law. Our pleas are nearly drowned out by this Impeachment process. We must urge Congress to make climate change legislation their TOP priority.




