FROM THE DEACON'S CORNER

The 'Out On The Lakeshore' Community Center was created in 2016 to provide a safe, open, and accepting space for the LGBTQA+ community to meet and receive the support and information it needs.

On the first Tuesday of each month at 'Out on the Lakeshore' (OOTL) we have a small get together called 'Out in Faith' from 7:00 - 8:30 pm.

The facilitators (usually two) are made up of clergy volunteers from some of the local churches. (Approximately 1% of the churches in the Holland area currently show support for LGBTQA persons).

Each pastor from these churches joins to help facilitate conversations about the church as an institution, and how it has affected the lives of those of the LGBTQA local population. We provide and promote a safe and relaxed environment for all to feel welcomed and open to voice their thoughts and opinions. As you might guess these conversations (at times) can be very emotional and soul searching for all involved. Our aim is to hopefully show through our actions and speech, that there are 'houses of faith' (within the Holland and connecting cities) that support, welcome, and love all of God's children!

Some that stop by OOTL (at 451 Colombia St, Holland) are younger high school and college age persons looking for a safe place, group activities, and a place to be heard and listened to. Great achievements toward acceptance and inclusion have been made for LGBTQA people in the last 5-10 years but now we are beginning to see some of those achievements being threatened by those who refuse to understand that God's love for all God's children means ALL!

I am moved every time a person acknowledges that there are communities that open their doors and their hearts to them. I am moved that I can say we here at All Saints welcome all. PERIOD!

DISCERNMENT TEAM RECTOR SEARCH UPDATE

Progress continues! We are delighted to share that at its December 19th meeting, the Vestry approved the multi-document All Saints' profile as prepared by your Discernment Team. We are grateful to the Vestry for their endorsement of our work and now hope for timely consideration and support from the Episcopal Diocese of Western Michigan (EDWM) and Bishop Hougland. We are moving forward through the various stages of validation with the confidence that our original timetable will not be interrupted.

As indicated in an earlier communication, after review and approval of our profile the Rector's position opening will be posted on the web site of The Episcopal Church for two months. Applications will be directed to the diocese for appropriate screening after which they will be forwarded to the Discernment Team for consideration.

On a personal note, we are so thankful for the Discernment Team that the Vestry assembled. Although each member was assigned a specific role, everyone has participated apart from those roles, be it research, or writing, or editing. We have worked these past four months in amazing collaboration; every voice heard, every meeting.

The Discernment Team will continue to meet regularly during January and February. In the meantime, we again encourage your on-going participation and patience with the process through the following prayer:

"Almighty God, giver of every good gift: Look graciously on your Church, and so guide the minds of those who shall choose a rector for this parish, that we may receive a faithful pastor, who will care for your people and equip us for our ministries; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Julia Lamb

I was born in Chicago, IL, moved to Holland when I was 12, graduated from Holland Christian High School and then Hope College.

I have been married to Jim for 31 years and we have three children; two married and one grandson. I work as a dental assistant during the week and work at Landsark's on the weekends.

About 20 years ago I started attending All Saints. My children and I would go to the 8:00 am service in the summers. About two years ago I made All Saints my full-time church.

I joined the book club over a year ago and it was then that I really wanted to get involved. (The book group is like family, we are there for one another.) I just started attending the Adult Sunday School and am enjoying that as well.

Since I was raised Christian Reformed/Reformed, I am still learning about the Episcopal way of doing things. I would be happy for any input about books that would help me in this endeavor.

While I am so sad that Father Corwin is retiring, he is the #1 reason I am here, I know God may be leading us to different paths. Showing Jesus to those around us should be our primary goal and I pray the Lord will lead me in His service.

Ron Richardson

My father's side of the family is all Mormon. My third great-grandfather traveled across the Great Plains to Provo, Utah from Denmark; walking alongside a covered wagon losing his wife and three of his children along the way. My mother's side of the family was and is fiercely German Lutheran. I was raised Lutheran. My earliest memories are sitting in church with my grandmother, listening to my parents sing in the choir. I knew even at that age that I wanted to sing like that or even better, make music like that. I grew up in Holland and went to Luther College in Decorah, Iowa. I have taught k-college orchestra and choir for 12 years in Iowa and Texas. I even taught voice for a short time in Baton Rouge, LA at Jimmy Swaggart Bible College! I have a Master's in Choral Conducting from LSU, and hold a Doctorate in Worship Theology from the Institute for Worship Studies in Orange Park, (Jacksonville) FL.

I have served many different churches through the years. I played my first service on the organ at age 12 in my Lutheran church. I served for over 20 years in a Charismatic/Pentecostal church in Laredo, TX on the Mexican border – the last 6 as full-time director of music. In that church I organized many city-wide events such as National Days of Prayer and Pray Laredo, which I founded. I taught classes on prayer and fasting and leadership

and finances. In Roseville, California (Sacramento) I served a large Presbyterian congregation for 7 years. I was director of worship and had a large staff, choir, and orchestra available every Sunday. After leaving Roseville, I served a smaller worshipping community in Sacramento called Epiclesis Church. They could be best described as Ancient-Future following the teachings of Robert Webber, a worship theologian. I led worship as well as leading a small group and being an elder – the equivalent to the Episcopal vestry member.

I come to All Saints having always been an outsider. I have never really fit in. I grew up in Holland, MI being neither Reformed nor Dutch. I went to Luther College and wasn't Norwegian. I lived many years in Laredo, TX and wasn't Roman Catholic or Hispanic. I lived in California and wasn't a native Californian. Worse yet, I came from Texas! Californians and Texans don't really get along well. However, being an Anglophile, and with the last name of Richardson, and being English, I feel like I really fit in at All Saints. I look forward to serving here in whatever ways the church and the vestry deem appropriate and well fitting.

Margo Bultman

Most of my life was spent in Fremont, Michigan; growing up and raising our children. Shortly after retiring from 30 years of teaching elementary school, Baars and I moved to Saugatuck in 2005. We started attending All Saints and experienced the presence of God in this historic church. We immediately knew this is where we wanted to worship. After a year or so, I began serving on Vestry for a three year term. Thereafter, I've been involved in several committees, most recently Mission Statement Task Team and Parish Life.

A while ago, I was approached to serve on Vestry again. I didn't have to pray about this decision very long as I felt the gravity and excitement of playing a role in the transition All Saints was experiencing. I would like to be a positive part of not only the transition, and selection of a rector, but also the joy in welcoming that person into our church community. Thank you for the prospect of serving on Vestry.

Baars and I have two grown children. Our son, Peter lives in Jacksonville, Florida. And our daughter, Marta, and her husband, Raj Malviya, live in Grand Rapids with their two children.

Tom Chesrown

I am a "cradle" Episcopalian and was baptized sometime in early 1950 in Perrysburg, Ohio. I attended public schools in Ohio, graduating from high school in 1968. I then studied at Middlebury College in Vermont graduating in 1972. From there I moved to Washington, DC, where I worked for some years at Brooks Brothers and became a member of St. Paul's "K" St. in Foggy Bottom. After a hiatus of a few years I again attended St. Paul's and was soon elected to the vestry where I served one term ending in 1989. This was NOT a good year for me as my partner died in August in the AIDS epidemic, the long time rector resigned and our much loved bishop, John Walker, died in the early fall of that year. I then felt that I should look for another parish where I didn't have so many sad associations. (By this time I had begun working in the wholesale home furnishings industry from which I retired as the National Sales Manager for two or three boutique, high end textile companies in 2010 in Chicago). Returning for a moment to my spiritual journey: I began looking for another, happier place to worship in 1990 while still in Washington, and visited a number of different parishes about which I had heard positive reports, one of which was St. Patrick's where the seminarian was a former member of St. Paul's and a good friend. It seemed that I kept returning every two or three weeks to St. Patrick's where I be-

gan to feel at home. This may have had something to do with my affinity for the rector, one S. James Steen. There followed a two year stint in purgatory when a small group of parishioners decided they didn't want me and Jim attending church there as a couple. Eventually, an equitable settlement was reached and Jim and I left St. Patrick's for good. We then took a break from parish life for a year or two when a warden from St. Mark's Capitol Hill approached Jim about doing a temporary interim ministry. It was a perfect fit and the next two years were among the happiest of my life; Jim's too, I believe. Then Chicago, where we were called (Jim as rector) in 1998 and we spent another twelve happy years at St. Paul and the Redeemer before the Bishop of Chicago called Jim to be his "Canon to the Ordinary" followed by a period when he was simultaneously working as the Dean of the Cathedral in Chicago. Whew! This was all positive for us but "Retirement" seems to have eluded Jim. However, life is good here and we love Saugatuck and All Saints.

CLIMATE CHANGE REPORT

From Isaiah 11: 6-9,”and a little child shall lead them”....

Greta Thunberg, a Swedish teen, visited America this past summer with an impassioned and clearly stated message that spoke to the tragedy of global warming, and the stubbornness and shamefulness of many of our lawmakers not taking any action about the climate changes the earth is experiencing.

Hannah Huggett, a 14 year old from Holland, Michigan, boldly led student strikes to bring attention to this predicament. If you want to read Hannah’s message see the Opinion Page in The Holland Sentinel, Thursday, December 19, 2019

Especially at this time of year, how spiritually beautiful it is for youth to remind adults of their responsibility in facing this critical challenge. Children, incredibly mature to the realities of the climate changes they will have to contend with in their generation and the next, are speaking out.

It is our own generation and those before ours that have created this problem and are silent. Climate Scientists worldwide agree that we humans have caused the climate to change by burning fossil fuels, namely, oil, gas and coal, at an ever increasing rate. These actions have raised the atmospheric CO₂ levels, by trapping heat at the earth’s surface and raising the temperature of land and sea. From the Book of Common Prayer, in The Prayers of the People, pp 329, we pray: “Open, O Lord, the eyes of all people and be faithful stewards of thy bounty.” To me these words mean it is all of us who are caretakers of this earth, and as such, our responsibility is to take corrective actions to bring CO₂ level back down to normal. How can we do that?

We can vote! According to many economists the **non-partisan H.R. 763** will be the best approach to getting this problem solved. But it is not law yet. Legislators that we know must be prodded into action.

Examining the details of H.R.763 as written it will: create a Carbon Dividend Trust Fund with the power to levy a Carbon Fee on the greenhouse gas content of coal, coal products, petroleum, petroleum products, and natural gas as it is extracted from the ground, and as it is imported. The fee amount is \$ 15 per metric ton of CO₂, CH₄, N₂O, SF₆, plus HFCs and PFCs. Mostly it is carbon dioxide, and methane. The U.S. uses about 10 million barrels of crude oil per DAY. A barrel of crude oil converts to about 30 gallons of gasoline, and it is used in the U.S. Each barrel used produces approximately 900 pounds of CO₂. That 900 pounds converts to 0.41 metric tons, and 10 million barrels makes 4,100,000 metric tons per DAY. And that results in a total fee of \$ 61.2 million per DAY! Note that this estimate does not include natural gas, and coal. So revenues generated will be much more!

So with revenues of this magnitude America could shift its market focus from oil, gas, and coal to biofuels, wind power, solar panels, battery development. Slowly but surely our air would get cleaner, and the world’s climate would inch back towards its earlier norms.

These visions can become the realities for the Greta Thunbergs and the Hannah Huggetts when America’s political will shifts away from fossil fuels. So keep writing and calling our Representatives, and Senators to make the Bill H.R. 763 into law.


