A completed form can be placed in the offering plate on Sundays or given to our church administrator during regular office hours throughout the week.

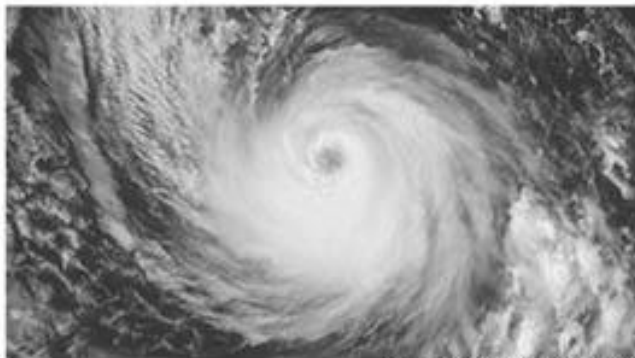
In the future, we also plan to have this form available online through the church's website.

# CITIZENS CLIMATE LOBBY

You probably have heard or seen on TV that our oceans are heating up. The worrisome thing is that it is happening faster than expected.

Sunlight strikes the ocean, some of it reflects off the surface back into the atmosphere. The increased CO2 in the atmosphere reflects back some of this light energy to the surface again and so on. Most importantly the ocean absorbs almost all of the infrared or heat energy from the sunlight within a puny 10 centimeters of the surface. That is just shy of 4 inches. In this very shallow layer, light energy is converted to heat which raises the water temperature causing increased evaporation. Remember more evaporation into the atmosphere equals more humidity equals more heavy rain. Earth's surface is some 70% ocean and 30% land which means significantly greater amount of sunlight is heating the ocean surface than the land. Average ocean temperature, which includes all ocean water top to bottom, is a cold 3.5 degrees C. (38.3 degrees F). In shallow ocean regions surface temperature of ocean water ranges from -2 degrees C. to +36 degrees C. (-28.4 degrees F. to +96.8 degrees F.) That latter temperature of 96.8 degrees F. in those shallow regions of the ocean cannot sustain marine life. Some coral reefs are dying. Areas of calm water, with no wind exacerbate the heating effect - water remains in place and its temperature continues to rise. Where there is wave action, the surface water mixes with deeper water and surface temperature rise is mitigated.

Citizens Climate Lobby CCL met on September 5 at DeGraaf Nature Center. There were 56 in attendance. Here is a summary of what local groups are doing to help preserve our environment: (I am indebted to Nancy Berg who graciously lent me her notes of the meeting)

**Peter Boogart** - Holland Area CCL Core member and District 2 Liaison spoke of the group's membership goal of 1000 members by 2020. Current roster membership is roughly 150. His big ask was for each member to invite two other friends or family members to join the group by either attending an upcoming meeting and signing up at that time or simply visiting the national website, [citizensclimatelobby.org](http://citizensclimatelobby.org) and press, 'join'. There is no membership fee or dues or any specific responsibilities put upon new members. During frequent sessions with local government officials, like West Michigan's representatives, Bill Huizenga and Fred Upton, Peter will be able to say that reducing carbon emissions is what these 1000 constituents want to see get done. Peter talked more about the HR 763, The Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act.

**Jan O'Connell** - West Michigan's chapter of the Sierra Club spoke of updates regarding the closing of coal plants along the lakeshore. The Grand Haven SIMS coal plant has been officially retired! The new target coal plant is West Olive's Port Sheldon, Consumers Energy Campbell coal plant. Ms. O'Connell urged members, and especially West Olive residents to sign a petition to shut down this plant which was tested positive for producing arsenic at levels two times higher than federal drinking water standards. Arsenic that is a result of coal ash getting into West Olive's drinking water when four private wells were tested. She also urged members to join Sierra Club and the fight to close down coal plants nationwide. Jan also shared information about an upcoming conference called, Rise Up and Draw Down Michigan. A Climate Change conference focused on community, collaboration, solutions, and action. It will be held on September 25, 2019 in Grand Rapids, at DeVos Place. Tickets and information will be found at [DrawDownMichigan.org](http://DrawDownMichigan.org).

**Hannah Huggett** – a student at Black River Montessori in charge of the 2019 Global Climate Student Strike planned for September 20 at the Holland Arts Council, 150 E. 8th Street, at 7:00 pm. Persons on attending should RSVP at [strikewithus.org](http://strikewithus.org). **Debra Williamson** - a former president and current member for the League of Women Voters and active member of the Holland Area CCL shared an overview of a website which was designed to get every person acting purposefully to counter the effects of climate change. The website, entitled, *A Lazy Person's Guide to Saving the World*, offered specific actions that anyone could take to improve the environment and reduce carbon emissions. The website is linked to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals website but can be found by title search. This website offers ideas for four levels of involvement. Debra also gave tips on how to address people who are hesitant to act in a productive way in the fight against Climate Change.

**Katelyn DeWitt** plus two fellow Hope College students summarized their work on “The Energy Saving Trees Program” that they themselves helped to create and initiate. After surveying close to 14,000 trees in Holland area, they were able to discern the environmental benefits between native and non-native trees, the benefits of environmental diversity in a given area, and the amount of pounds of carbon emissions is captured and held by each tree. They referenced two APPs that were used in the study, I-Tree and TreeSap. They hope to continue the program into the coming year so that it may be used for future city planning.

**Morgan Kelly** - is a program specialist with the Holland Board of Public Works. She reported on the success of the Holland's Energy-Saving Trees Program 2019 which resulted in the planting of 300 trees, locally. Designed to educate consumers the program shows the benefits of planting trees in strategic locations that will save energy and lower utility bills. By participating residents help with energy conservation. This program will be offered again, in 2020.

**Laura Judge** - a core member of CCL gave a status report on opposition to Enbridge Oil Company's Line 5, the proposed tunnel and upcoming voting process. Shut Down Line 5 signs and bumper stickers can be purchased. See websites: [OilandWaterDon'tMix](http://OilandWaterDon'tMix) and [FLOW](http://FLOW) (FortheLoveof Water). Laura encouraged members to stay involved and current: check the Line 5 websites, write the Governor to show your support for shutting down Line 5 and remind her of the government's role of protecting the Great Lakes.

**Rebecca Bochenek and Mary Jackson** - members of the Veg Lakeshore group shared about the importance of a plant-based diet in reducing carbon emissions. The Veg Lakeshore group's purpose is to spread information about the benefits of vegan and vegetarian options. **Jerilyn Tucker** - a member of both the League of Women Voters and of the Holland Area CCL described efforts to coordinate an Environmental Film Series to be shown at local venues. Her hope is to continue to educate residents about environmental issues and outcomes.



## OUTREACH MINISTRY TEAM UPDATE

The focus of the Outreach Ministry Team remains on finding ways to support children and families in our communities with our time, talent and treasure.

- Christian Neighbors – For a number of years members of our parish have supported Christian Neighbors volunteering, donating, and contributing; we are especially grateful to Arthur Frederick and Mark Vanderleek; Fr. David and Margie Mason; and, Carol Garvelink for the “above and beyond” initiatives they personally have taken to assure Christian Neighbors is able to serve its mission. ASE’s financial and volunteer support will continue in 2020!
- Children First Lakeshore – CFL is a more recent addition to our commitment of serving, and was founded by a group of local citizens who are concerned that in this time of great abundance for many, the number of children going hungry in our communities is growing. Yes, food insecurity (a more comfortable way of describing hunger) is a growing issue for children in our schools and by extension their families. One of the ways of determining the extent of childhood hunger is by using the percentage of children who are eligible for the federal free/reduced lunch programs in our schools. Given that there are approximately 35% of children who qualify in Saugatuck and Douglas, and 84% who qualify in Fennville, CFL is working with the schools in providing children who sign up with backpacks every Friday filled with one full meal for a family plus zip-lock baggies containing one child’s breakfast, one lunch, plus snacks. What more can we do other than support CFL financially? We can show up on Thursdays at the Community Church in Douglas (main entrance) at 1:30 p.m. to assist in packing the backpacks!
- Saugatuck-Douglas Rotary Club – With the leadership of current President Jim Sullivan and many of our own parishioners, the Rotary Club is working to partner with the Boys & Girls Club of Holland to establish an extension here in Saugatuck-Douglas at our elementary and high school locations. The Club has raised \$75,000 for this purpose and is on track to start the after-school programs early next spring at Douglas Elementary School and, later, the middle and high schools. The Rotary Club hopes to enlist those with the heart and interest in tutoring, mentoring, and teaching children to augment the professional staff who will manage these programs. Interestingly, Jim has been talking to Children’s First Lakeshore to coordinate and possibly help fund the distribution of the weekend backpacks. The Rotary Club will need to continue fundraising for the duration of the next three years to fully fund a pilot test of how these programs lift student achievement, so that big sustaining funding sources will commit to the programs over the long term. Needed: mentors, teachers, tutors and check-writers!

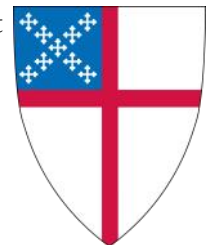
